The Regional Outreach and Shared Care Program

Approximately 30% of the children and adolescents with cancer treated by The Royal Children's Hospital (RCH) and Monash Children's Hospital (MCH) live in regional areas.

The goal of the Regional Outreach and Shared Care Program (ROSCP) is to provide care as close to home as possible when it is safe and appropriate to do so.

The program:

- provides education and training to staff at regional centres who care for children and adolescents with cancer
- facilitates regional care coordination through a formal shared care model with the RCH and MCH.

The program enables shared care between your primary treating hospital and the regional centre closest to where you live.

Can my child have shared care?

Your oncologist and/or your Nurse Consultant will make this decision by taking into consideration the following:

- your place of residence
- your child's diagnosis
- treatment protocol
- end of treatment surveillance/follow-up requirements.

When should I call my local hospital?

Remember, if your child is unwell and you are seeking advice, **please call your team in the children's cancer centre first**, on the number you were provided. However, there may be many reasons you may want to call your local hospital. They may include:

- To organise a tour for my child to meet the staff in the department to orientate to the ward and feel more comfortable with the surroundings (optional).
- When advised after calling your oncology treating team, to alert your regional health service that you need to present to the emergency department for review.

Regional outreach clinics

Clinics take place at some regional centres across Victoria throughout the year. They are run by one of the treating oncologists and oncology nurse consultants. The months listed below are approximate and may vary by year.

Telehealth

Regional families often need to travel long distances to attend appointments for a number of years.

Telehealth appointments may be available for families living in regional areas or interstate, whose children are medically suitable. This is a video link between your oncologist at RCH or MCH, you and your child, with your child's GP or paediatrician.

Please ask your Oncologist if your child can have telehealth appointments.
